# Coding Specialist

What does a Coding Specialist do?

A Coding Specialist/Coder is an individual who reviews and analyzes health records to identify the diagnoses and procedures for each time a patient seeks healthcare advice. The Coding Specialist is responsible for translating diagnostic and procedural medical terminology phrases into coded form.

# Where does a Coding Specialist work?

Coding Specialists work in hospital departments such as health information services, quality management, professional fee services, radiology, emergency room, outpatient/ambulatory surgery, ancillary services and specialty physician clinics, insurance companies, government agencies and health maintenance organizations.

# Employment Outlook

Employment opportunities for the Coding Specialist is expected to grow faster than the average for all occupations through the year 2016.
